


Check out our new website!

Northern Plains and partners award grants totaling \$32,000

orthern Plains Electric Cooperative (NPEC) recently teamed up with CoBank and Basin Electric Power Cooperative to donate \$30,000 to four nonprofit organizations who contribute to the communities that NPEC serves.

At its July board meeting, the Northern Plains Electric board of directors granted \$2,500 to four nonprofit organizations, including the Rolette County Firefighters Association, Minnewaukan Rural Fire Protection District, Sheyenne Fire Department and the Bowdon Ambulance Service District. Both CoBank and Basin Electric matched the \$2,500, granting each organization \$7,500.

CoBank, a cooperative leading institution headquartered in Denver, Colo., makes these funds



available through its Sharing Success matching grant program. The program was designed to celebrate the vital role that cooperatives play in individual communities across the county.

Basin Electric is a wholesale electric generation and transmission cooperative headquartered in Bismarck that provides electricity to electric cooperatives in nine states, including Northern Plains Electric.

In addition to the \$30,000 in grants, being that Northern Plains is a member of the Rural Development Finance Corporation (RDFC), it was eligible to apply for a grant of up to \$2,000 for community-based projects in its service area. RDFC granted \$500 to four communitybased projects in the Northern Plains service area. Those organizations include Can-Do Senior Citizens, Bowdon Ambulance Service District, Shevenne Fire Department and the Minnewaukan Rural Fire Protection District. RDFC makes these funds available so more people become aware of its larger loan program that funds community-based projects and nonprofit entities with lowinterest loans.

Northern Plains is thankful to have partners like CoBank, Basin Electric and RDFC who contribute to the communities they serve. ■

eatherizing your home is one of the best investments you can make to reduce utility costs and extend the life of your heating and cooling equipment. The primary goal of weatherization is to create a solid barrier that separates the conditioned air inside your home from the outdoor air. This can be accomplished by using a variety of different materials and sealing techniques.

Seal the perimeter: Older homes are very porous, so it's important to seal all the gaps and penetrations in the exterior walls to reduce unwanted air infiltration. Caulking around electrical and plumbing penetrations and sealing the gap under the sill plate will reduce winter drafts and save energy.

Duct sealing: Ductwork leaks rob your HVAC system of efficiency and can cause your heating and cooling bills to skyrocket. Duct sealing is a process that eliminates gaps, leaks and loose connections through the application of a specially formulated duct sealant material.

- **Add insulation:** Besides slowing the flow of thermal energy, adding insulation to your ceiling and walls helps to fill structural gaps while providing a natural air infiltration barrier. Check out blown-in-place insulation systems, which also have excellent noise reduction properties.
- Weatherstripping for windows and doors: Fixing a cracked or broken window improves efficiency and also eliminates a safety issue. Weatherstripping around doors and windows saves energy, and it's easy to apply. Cover single-pane windows with storm windows or replace them with more efficient double-pane windows. Remove your plywood attic scuttle panel and replace it with an insulated access door so you'll have a tight, energy efficient seal. ■

- Installation of electric heating systems
 - Dual heat
 - Storage or slab heat

- All-electric heat
- Air-to-air heat pump
- Ground-source heat pump

peration Round Up wouldn't be possible without you, the Northern Plains member who generously elects to have his or her electric bill rounded up to the next dollar. The donated amount averages about 50 cents a month for each participating member and raises approximately \$37,000 each year.

Since the program's beginning in October 1998, grants totaling \$815,062 have been awarded to 1,127 local charitable causes.

At its September meeting, the Northern Plains Electric Operation Round Up board of directors approved grants totaling \$9,600 to help support worthy causes.

FIRE PREVENTION IT SAVES LIVES

PREVENTION: IT SAVES LIVES. Installing smoke alarms on every level of your home, testing them regularly, and replacing smoke alarms every 10 years are some of the steps you can take to keep your family safe.

PREVENTION



AFCI Breakers and Outlets can prevent **50%** of residential home fires.



3,300 home fires originate from extension cords each year. Heavy reliance on extension cords is a sign to have more outlets installed.



Each year **2,400** children in the US are treated for injuries caused by outlets. **1/3** of parents do not have outlets childproofed. Install **Tamper Resistant Receptacles**.



The CPSC found 47% of electrocutions could be prevented with GFCI protection in homes.



470,000 counterfeit smartphone batteries were recalled in one year due to burn and **fire hazards**. Purchase electronics at reputable retailers.



Frequently **tripped circuit breakers** or blown fuses and cracking, sizzling or buzzing from outlets can be signs of an overloaded circuit. **47,700 home fires** in the US are caused by electrical failure or malfunction each year.

SMOKE ALARMS: REPLACE EVERY 10 YEARS



BATTERIES: TEST MONTHLY, REPLACE YEARLY



2/3 of **fire deaths** occur in homes with no, or nonfunctioning, smoke alarms.



Have **at least one smoke alarm** on every floor, outside each sleeping area, and in every bedroom.

Energy assistance available



re you or someone you know having difficulty paying home heating bills? If so, there is a federal program that could help.

The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) helps eligible low-income households with home energy assistance.

Eligible households are encouraged to apply for assistance for:

• **HEATING ASSISTANCE:** LIHEAP can pay for a portion of fuel or electricity used to heat the

home you live in during the months between Oct. 1 and May 31. The amount of benefit depends on your income, the type and size of your home, and the type of fuel used to heat your home.

- WEATHERIZATION SERVICE: The
 weatherization program helps low income
 families make their homes and apartments
 energy efficient. Weatherization seals a home
 to keep warm air in and cold air out during
 the winter.
- FURNACE AND CHIMNEY CLEANING: The program can pay (up to a certain amount of monies dependent on the service) to clean and inspect your furnace and/or chimney.
- **EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE:** LIHEAP funds are available when there is a home energy emergency that may threaten the life of your family.
- ENERGY COST REDUCTION DEVICES: Funds are sometimes available to help with installation costs of energy-reducing devise to qualify for lower electric heat rates.

Applications are accepted from Oct. 1- May 31 of each heating season. For LIHEAP services, call your local county social services office or contact: Energy Assistance Program N.D. Department of Human Services at 1-800-755-2716. ■
